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






Background

- HIV transmission in the New Zealand context.
- Reducing the levels of undiagnosed HIV².4
- HIV self-testing (HST) was identified as a tool to increase access to testing and address barriers to testing
- The New Zealand AIDS Foundation (NZAF) conducted an HST pilot project with 500 HST kits, between Dec '17 and May '18




<u>Results</u>


The uptake of the service among target groups, and HIV positivity rate, compared favourably with rapid HIV tests conducted in community settings.

	HIV self-test kits shipped by NZAF between 1 Dec 2017 and 31 May 2018 (n=498)	Rapid HIV tests completed at NZAF community centres 1 Jul 2017 – 31 May 2018 (n=4,120)
% clients GBM	88%	84%
% GBM clients indigenous Māori	8.9%	5%
% GBM clients Pacific Islander	2.3%	2.3%
% clients African	3.6%	1.9%
% clients outside Auckland, Wellington or Christchurch	51%	0.9%
% GBM reporting non-recent testing (never or not in last 12 months)	81%	32%
% clients who had reported results back at 28 days	69%	N/A
# preliminary positive results reported	5	13
Positivity rate (positives per 1000 tests)	10.0	3.2


Recent testing among GBM using NZAF services 2017/18

Positivity rate of NZAF testing services 2017/18





Conclusions and next steps

- HST has increased HIV testing among populations underserved by NZAF centres.
- Five preliminary positives from 498 tests during the pilot suggests that the service reached the right people.
- Scaled-up HST has occurred as a result of the Pilot we are seeing the same trends.
- From July 2018, NZAF began selling HST kits to clients who do not meet triage criteria. Currently selling 17.8% of the HST ordered
- A coupon/voucher system is also being developed to distribute HST kits through sex-on-premises venues and other channels.

Conclusions and next steps cont.

- Feedback from people using HST is overwhelmingly positive
- Economical
- We now have word of mouth process occurring
- Keep reviewing the information in the HST kit based on feedback
- An alternative for those who struggle with blood
